

Plans are almost completed for our 1996 programs. They are listed elsewhere in this newsletter. With your participation, I am sure they too will be successful.





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HERITAGE FAIR - 1995

Sunday October 1, brought for the second annual Heritage Fair, all Martha Landon had promised, good weather and good food. The day dawned bright, sunny and warm; the food, home made beef sandwiches to elderberry pie, at Martha and Cheryl's canteen was equally a hit!

As at last years event, several members and participants dressed in costume. Many of these were authentic. This is a tradition we would like to see continued and expanded on in future years.

This year we added several new attractions, foremost of which was the Antique Tractor Pull held in front of the grandstand. Sixty-four tractors were entered by fourty-eight competitors. This made an impressive lineup in the infield pit area. This event could not have occurred without the organization and participation of the South Lake Tractor Pullers. Visitors were greeted by the "Upper Canada Free Trappers" living display of early fur trade along the Great Lakes. A good selection of antique cars lead to a display of operating gasoline engines and chain saws. Robert Webster's cider press provided the ever popular fresh apple cider. Fresh honey products, hand made candles, home made jams, native arts and popcorn were also offered for sale.

In the Red Building were displays by St. Lawrence Islands National Parks, Victorian screen doors and furniture by Heritage Woodwork, architecture by Ballycanoe & Co., Andrew and Katherine Graham's antique glass, Leeds & Grenville Genealogical Society and Lansdowne Rural Telephone Co. Maxi Ohlroggen was back to demonstrate turning sheep's wool into yarn on her spinning wheel while Carol Gorsin displayed her quilting art. Children of all ages had an opportunity to try non-competitive games at the Inkwell Learning Material's display. Glenda Olivier and Katherine Graham had a keen competition at their crockonole and checker tournament,

Outside, blacksmith Helmut Warmbein worked at his coal-fired forge. Byron Landon cut firewood with a tractor driven circular saw, while George Burns operated a 1940's thrashing machine that was once operated by his father throughout the area. The Leeds Cloggers, 1000 Islands Oldtime Fiddlers and Board Feet provided continuous entertainment on the outside stage.

The Society thanks all who made this day a success, especially the Agricultural Society, for once again allowing us the use of the Lansdowne Fair Grounds.


HELP MAKE THE HERITAGE FAIR BIGGER & BETTER IN 1996

FAMILY OF JAMES TRICKEY AND MARGARET WEBSTER By Allan Lindsay

James Trickey was the son of John Trickey and Ann Miller. Ann was the daughter of Zebudee Miller UEL. They lived off the Trickey farm at Selton near Lansdowne. They had twelve children. James died about 1850. Margaret was born c.1805 and died after 1891.



DARLINGSIDE - THE LAST OF AN ERA By Bill Boulton



In 1991, Darlingside was advertised for sale. A small group of locals was concerned that another peice of history would disappear with no record. That was the beginning of this society.

Over the last four years, Mr. Robert Wallace and his sister, Louise Hockey, have been generous in allowing us to tour, photograph and record the premises. This property, became one of four Lisa Thompson researched in our first summer program. In June, the final parcel of Darlingside, containing the four buildings, was sold.

Diane Hall, Township Clerk, immediately arranged for us to tour the property again. This was done early on Friday morning June 16, 1995. We asked for permission to remove all remaining paper from the store for later sorting. Permission was granted provided we finished before noon on Monday June 19, one step ahead of the auctioneers.

Mrs. Hall provided three men and a truck from the road department and three of the office staff, as well as going herself. We removed many boxes and trunks of papers from the store as well as books and papers from the house. We were also allowed to remove several small items of historical interest. Among these were a primitive treadle sewing machine and a hand operated vacuum cleaner.

On a recent visit to the Henry Ford Museum in Dearborn Michigan, I discovered an exact mate of our vacuum cleaner. It is the oldest in their Home Arts section, listed as "Suction Cleaner. New Home Vacuum Cleaner. R. Armstrong Manufacturing Co. Cincinnati, Ohio. 1910-1915."


We have made only a small dent in sorting this material. It is a long, slow, dirty job. At some later date we will attempt to publish a list of the material. Of interest so far are voters lists for 1863 & 1868, blue-prints for the Presbyterian Church and the Drill Hall and a file of invoices from Alan Earl, Merchant, Lansdowne Tilley Post Office.

The Historical Society would like to thank Mrs. Hall and the Township Staff for their assistance in obtaining, removing and storage space for this material until we can sort it. Especially we would like to thank Mr. Robert Wallace for allowing us access to the property and permission to remove the material. As I left that Monday afternoon, Mr. Wallace, great grandson of the founder Thomas Darling, sadly said, "Well, I guess this is the end of an era". After 150 years of continuous use by the Darling family, I believe he is correct.

POST OFFICES IN THE PIONEERING DAYS by Paul Cote

In the early days of British North America there was no postal system as we understand it today. The mails were carried and distributed, largely, by private individuals. They performed this service either as favour, or as a business venture. "Post offices" in most places were private, or at best, "semi-official" operations. Government Post Offices were few and far between. The civilian post office in Kingston was open by 1780 but Leeds and Grenville didn't see its first officially listed post office until 1811, when one opened in Brockville. An office had operated, though, in Elizabethtown from 1789, Gananoque followed in 1817, and Lansdowne was later, in 1852.

Mail was paid for by the receiver in those days, and the cost could be high. The cost of receiving overseas mail was even higher. As a consequence senders and receivers sometimes developed systems to avoid the fees. The author of Early Pioneer Life in Upper Canada recounts the story of a girl and her brother who developed their own system. When she received mail from him she could tell by the post mark where he was, and by other marks he had put on the outside of the letter she could tell how he was doing. Upon seeing the information she would tell the post master that she couldn't afford the letter and leave it in his hands.



Postage stamps were introduced in the British Isles in 1840 and in British North America in 1851 when the Crown transferred responsibility for the postal system to Colonial authorities. The first stamp was the "three penny black" which was followed almost immediately by the first general use stamp, the "three penny beaver". These pennies were in the Imperial system of Pounds and shillings. Our decimal system was not introduced until 1858.

After 1851 the postal system became more as we know it today. From then on it expanded the number of offices as the population of the country grew, from 601 in 1851 to 2336 in 1867. The expansion appears to have continued until just before the First World War when an economic depression caused the massive closing of smaller post offices. Fully half of the Post Offices in the Front of Leeds and Lansdowne Township closed at this time.

POST OFFICES OF THE FRONT OF LEEDS AND LANSDOWNE TOWNSHIP

The following list was extracted from <u>Place Names of Ontario</u>. The author, Floreen Ellen Carter, has put together the most complete source of information on place names available for the Province. Of special interest is her use of Federal Post Office publications to locate the rural post offices of the past.

There were 18 post offices in total in the Front of Leeds and Lansdowne. Six were located in Leeds Fownship of which one still exists, and twelve were located in Lansdowne Township of which one still exists. The reason for the small number in Leeds Township is immediately obvious when one looks at a topographic map; large stretches of land, especially in the north-east and south-west corners of the township are largely rock and swamp. Consequently settlement was sparse in these areas.

NOTES:

- * Leeds was officially renamed Maple Grove in 1974, possibly because of the Leeds in the Rear of Leeds and Lansdowne Township. The Post Office at Leeds does not appear in <u>Place Names of Ontario</u> but is mentioned in the <u>Clerk's Voters List Book</u> for the Front of Leeds and Lansdowne, 1901 1924, in the Darlingside Collection. The collection was acquired by our Society this summer. It is now being inventoried.
- (1) Now called Springfield on topographic maps.
- (2) Bowell appears to have been named after Sir Mackenzie Bowell, Prime Minister from 1894 to 1896. Now called Union.
- (3) According to <u>Place Names of Ontario</u> the "e" was officially added to Lansdowne in 1872. It was named after the Marquis of Lansdowne, William P. Fitzmaurice.

- (4) Originally called Fairfax (from the days when Leeds and Grenville Counties were still part of the Johnstown District) it had its own post office from 1863 to 1867. By 1893 the area was called Melcombe. This lasted until at least 1923. A map exists from that date with the designation Melcombe. Later it became known, once again, as Fairfax. The reason for this name change is unknown. One current story has it that it was changed because there was another Melcombe with which it was confused by postal officials. Place Names of Ontario, though, lists no other Melcombes, past or present, in the entire province.
- (5) Mount Webster appears to have been at what is now the Outlet. The Postmaster, Robert Webster (1807-1871), lived at Con 6, lot 14, and on the 1861 census is recorded as owning a water powered sawmill. The Post Office called Outlet opened in 1891.
- (6) The Warburton P.O. appears to have been located, at first, on the Dulcemaine Road near the present Lyndhurst highway. Later it moved to the commonly known location on Warburton Road.
- (7) Originally called McCrone's Corners. The P.O. was called Wilstead after Robert Wilson, the first Postmaster. Upon his death in 1901, the P.O. was moved to Kyes Corners. It was from Kyes Corners that it was closed in 1912.


